EDITOR'S NOTE

This past weekend I watched a YouTube video in which famed folk singer, Joan Baez received an award. Two fine musicians, Emmy Lou Harris and Mary Chapin Carpenter paid tribute to Baez by singing one of the songs she made famous, *We Shall Overcome*. As soon as I heard the first three notes of the gospel song that became an anthem for the Civil Rights Movement in the 1960s, I was struck by the poignancy of the song and how in 2021, *We Shall Overcome* still holds so much meaning.

This has been a tough couple of weeks for Canadians. The discovery of 215 Indigenous children's remains in Kamloops, BC, followed by the horrific murder of a Muslim family, save for one nine-year old boy, in London, ON have left us struggling with too many questions and too few answers. The faith of Canadian Christians has been challenged, possibly to the breaking point. *When*, we may ask, shall we overcome? When will we overcome suffering, bigotry, pain, historic injustices and current ones?

Here in the EOORC there has been an outpouring of sadness, shock, and an urgency to care and give our love to the people suffering the most. Many congregations are honoring those who've lost their lives through vigils, prayer and symbols of remembrance and reconciliation. Our ministry and spiritual leaders have reached out and offered scripture and other words of wisdom and comfort.

Moderator Rev. Richard Bott and Rev. Murray Pruden delivered a response to the Kamloops tragedy and the United Church of Canada put out a statement condemning the attack in London. I encourage you to read them. The links are to the right of this editorial.

Meanwhile, the work of the EOORC continues and you can read about meaningful activities and events here in this (rather packed) newsletter.

A New Stole for the EOORC President

Last year, Isabel Bender was commissioned to create a very special item for the EOORC. Rev Rosemary asked the Ottawa resident and member of City View United to make a stole for the EOORC president that would capture the elements of the EOORC logo.

Isabel, an experienced quilter took on the assignment and designed a beautiful version of the bright green, blue and red logo.

"The stole is made of cotton fabric and the maple leaf, cross, rivers and fields are appliqued on top of the white background. It is all stitched by machine," she explains.

While Isabel typically creates fabric art with patchwork, this was the first time she used applique.

In April of this year, Isabel presented the completed stole to EOORC president, Rev. Takouhi Demirdjian.

"I was delighted to present the stole to Rev Takouhi at her home in Portland. It was lovely to meet her and enjoy a socially distanced chat in the midst of the lockdown," says Isabel.

Rev. Takouhi proudly wore the stole at the EOORC Annual Meeting in May. She, of course, is honoured and delighted to be the first president to don the "amazing stole" and looks forward to passing it on to our next president when the time comes.



The following motion was approved at the recent annual meeting of the Eastern Ontario Outaouais Region

That the Eastern Ontario Outaouais Region enter the process of discernment to become an affirming ministry that celebrates diversity and works to affirm the value and full inclusion of all people.

Goals of the Affirming Ministry Program • to help and support United Church ministries, partners, and wider society in their ministry to and with people of all sexual orientations and gender identities • to identify United Church ministries and partners that are willing to publicly declare affirmation of people of all sexual orientations and

gender identities as full participants in the Body of Christ • to broaden justice concerns within the church and society The Affirming Ministry Program acknowledges the hurt and injustice the church has caused to many social groups—not just to LGBTQIA2S+ people but also to Black, Indigenous and people of colour (BIPOC), in our racism and fear of those who are different from ourselves, and through our silencing or exclusion of people because of their class and economic background, their age, ability, culture, gender, and ethnicity, or their physical or mental health.

The Affirming Ministry Program, while it focuses on issues of gender identity and sexual orientation, seeks to live into a vision of justice and inclusion for all God's people.


We will be holding a series of educational workshops during the discernment process of becoming an affirming ministry.

UNITED WE STAND UPDATE by Sue Smarkala

As you may know, the EOORC is actively raising funds for Multifaith Housing Initiative's **Veterans' House**, a new facility to house homeless veterans. To date, about 35 – 40 percent of EOORC pastoral charges have contributed to this campaign.



Their contributions were either in dollars or in more than 200 guilts and shawls for the veterans.

We would love to see 100 percent participation in this first cross-regional fundraising project.

Our "United We Stand" EOORC campaign goal is \$150,000. To date, we have achieved close to 60 percent of that amount. Please consider supporting our push to raise the remaining \$60,000 by the end of June.
