

Inaugural Meeting
Saturday, September 28, 2019
Trinity U.C., Smiths Falls, Ontario

Barb DeJeet lead the gathering music of: Come in Come in and Sit Down; Worship the Lord, Over My Head, One More Step Along the World I Go.

Elaine Williams of East Central Ontario Regional UCW was the pianist.

Co-president Linda Stronski welcomed everyone, noting this is her home church. Linda led in the reciting of the UCW Purpose and Indigenous Acknowledgement. Co-president Kim Baird lit the Christ Candle and acknowledged the area/presbyterials.

Ottawa UCW led worship with an opening reading. Scripture was from Luke 12: 13-17. Worship was closed with prayer. Seaway Valley UCW did the Offering with a prayer by Kim Baird

Sandra Stakenvicius presented the power point on behalf of our guest speakers Debbie and her husband Rev. Dave as they were called away to Bermuda. It was an informative presentation on the life in Zambia.

Linda thanked her. "I am proud we have chosen Women of Zambia, which will help the young ladies stay in school and get an education and improve their lifestyle." It's a five-year project of the NUCW.

**MOTION:** Moved by Denise Wood and seconded by Nancy Hazen that the offering from the inaugural meeting go to Women of Zambia. **CARRIED**.

It was noted that in its first year, the NUCW has raised \$18,000.

**MOTION**: Moved by Louise Shaw and seconded by Arlene McKibbon to accept the agenda. **CARRIED** 

Communications chair Connie Tabbert asked that a spot be on the agenda for a group photo of those attending the inaugural meeting.

### **APPROVAL OF EXECUTIVE**

Barb DeJeet read aloud the executive: Kim Baird and Linda Stronski are co-presidents; Vice-President - Vacant; Past-President Barb DeJeet; Secretary—Connie Tabbert; Treasurer—Kim Baird; 2 Members at large—Arlene McKibbon and Linda Hamon; Stewardship - Carolle Dallas-Arbuckle; Leadership - Charlotte Hoy; Resources—Nancy Hazen; Communications—Connie Tabbert; Archives – Vacant; Area/Presbyterial Reps: Upper Valley-Connie Tabbert, Seaway Valley-Sharon Hinton, Ottawa-Pat Ashton, Four Rivers- Charlotte Hoy.

Barb noted we have until May to fill the two empty positions. "It would be nice to have a full slate of officers. We are coming together as Christ's daughters to do His work." If anyone

is interested in filling the positions, talk to Barb.

**MOTION:** Moved by Lee Torvi and seconded by Denise Wood to approve the executive until the AGM in May. **CARRIED** 

### APPROVAL OF BUDGET

Kim Baird reviewed the budget (attached).

**MOTION:** Moved by Barb McGonegal and seconded by Pat Ashton to accept the 2019 financial statement for 2019. **CARRIED** 

**MOTION:** Moved by Charlotte Hoy and seconded by Louise Shaw to accept the Budget 2020.

**MOTION TO AMEND**: Moved by Barb McGonegal and seconded by Lee Torvi that the amount for NUCW Resource be amended to to \$1,268 from \$500, which reflects \$1 a member as per our 2018 stats for our region

**MOTION TO AMEND**: Moved by Denise Wood and seconded by Irene Tannick to change the NUCW Resource amount to \$1,000 from \$1,268. **DEFEATED** 

**MOTION** to accept the Amended Budget. CARRIED.

Kim also spoke about various grants that are available to UCW members—Agatha Kaasa Bursary and the Dorothy Amos Fund—some of which can be used to attend the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of UCW in Sydney, NS in 2022. Application forms are available on the United Church website.

### **HOUSE RULES (BYLAWS)**

Barb DeJeet reviewed the house rules and there was much discussion. Spelling mistakes and grammatical errors will be corrected. There was also a recommendation under the Treasurer & Finance Chair to include an item about having the books reviewed annually.

**MOTION:** Moved by Sharon Hinton and seconded by Betty Faith to accept the House Rules with the changes brought forward. **CARRIED.** 

### **BURSARY FUND**

Linda Stronstki spoke about creating a bursary fund. She noted it would be for anyone studying to become an ordained or diaconal minister. People receive financial help from the fund which is established. The EOOR UCW would be provided with the names of those who are attending ministry and if they qualify, the money is split between all of them.

Barb DeJeet said the discussion was taking place because it was hoped EOOR would carry on the tradition of financially helping those seeking the ministry, but stressed it was only to be for those from EOOR.

*NOTE:* No motion was entertained to approve an EOOR UCW Bursary Fund. However, taking into consideration of the feel of the membership in attendance through discussion and comments it was supported.

Linda Stronski noted that Marilyn Rodger is here as fair trade representative as is Pat Gil-

more The Book Lady' – both are downstairs.

Charlotte Hoy said grace and two group pictures were taken.

Adjourned for lunch at 12:08 p.m.

Following the gathering of music at 12:55 p.m., a 'wedding ceremony' occurred in the place of a skit, marrying Ottawa-Montreal, Seaway Valley, Four Rivers and Upper Valley into Eastern Ontario Outaouais Regional United Church Women.

It was rewritten by Kim from a skit done "a long time ago" when the WA joined the WMS and formed UCW.

SUMMER EVENT – Kim Baird spoke about the Summer Event. Montreal Ottawa Conference UCW has been hosting for 78 years. She invited everyone from Regions 11, 12 and 13 to the 2020 event, which is held in Cornwall the last weekend in July. There is a theme, speaker, workshops and a great opportunity to meet other UCW members.

CAMP QUIN MO LAC – Lee Torvi provided a report on the camp, which is attached.

NUCW MEETING – Linda and Kim both spoke about the recent NUCW fall meeting, agreeing it was a wonderful time. There were meetings from 9 a.m. until 9 p.m.

The 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of UCW will be held in Sydney NS from July 11-15, 2022. A committee has been working on the special event. Sally Armstrong is the guest speaker. Registration will only be online. Various tours are planned. The cost is \$400 plus room. There will only be 22 people allowed per region.

NUCW SURVEY – Kim Baird spoke about the survey. There are 1,026 UCW units across Canada and 574 responded, which is 56 percent. The total membership of UCW in 2018 was 17,280 of those, 108 have answered the call to become Licence Lay Worship Leaders.

For EOOR 45 units responded; 35 units donated \$223,541 to church, 37unites donated \$77,766 to community outreach; 423 UCW sit on other committees and boards within their church and 14 service their regions as LLWL.

"We do make a difference. Let's keep on making a difference," she said. Report is attached.

REGIONAL COUNCIL – Linda Stronski is a member as of June. She noted there is no seat at the table for UCW, which seems to be the policy across Canada. At the first meeting recently held, the board members introduced themselves and reviewed the governance report. The next meeting is in Prescott on Oct. 5.

ARCHIVES – Elaine Farley provided a detailed report on archives. (Connie is hopeful of obtaining this report and sending it to executive members, who can then send it to their UCWs.)

She also spoke about Old Hay Bay Church, located near Napanee. The church, which is a national historical site, is open May 24 weekend to Thanksgiving weekend each year. Elaine was recently elected chair, noting she is the first woman chair and the first to be a non-minister chair.

Linda Stronski said, "It's a unique place to go and visit," pointing out that the Bay of Quinte Contributed funds for the new windows.

Elaine provided a power point of photos, explaining the various work that is being done.

*INSTALLATINON OF EXECUTIVE* – Barb DeJeet carried out the duty of installing the executive, which was then followed by a group photo.

**COURTESIES** were provided by Lee Torvi, noting, "This is an historic occasion." **ADJOURNMENT** was moved by Linda Hamon at 3:28 p.m.

### Leadership Report for 2020

Due to COVID-19 no in-person workshops could be held. Instead, I arranged an on-line Zoom workshop lead by Jane Dawson concerning the Psalms.

This workshop was attended by women from the entire region.

In the time allowed we learned about the emotions of lament, despair and questing for God. Also, we learned about turning points and the return to hope, encouragement and even joy. Some of the ladies even wrote some psalms in response to the information share.

This was a very interactive workshop with all the participants involved. The feedback was greatly appreciative for the session and a request was made for more in the future.








There are multiple threats to adolescent girls' education. They require a comprehensive approach.

- raise awareness of education as a basic right and an essential strategy to lift women and families out of poverty in rural Zambia

Women for Change anchors its work addressing gender inequalities, social exclusion, and marginalization of women and girls in rural areas to create an environment that empowers women and girls to actively participate in community development.



### Women for Change, Zambia

UCW Project Description United Church Women have a long tradition of supporting the ministries of The United Church of Canada through Mission & Service. Through units, regional UCWs, and the NUCW, the United Church Women in all configurations have been, and continue to be active and generous supporters of local ministry in their communities as well as joining together to work for peace and justice, supporting ministries throughout Canada and around the world.

Mission & Service is about God's mission in the world and how The United Church of Canada participates in that mission. United Church Women have been outstanding in their generous contributions enabling global partnership, community ministry, social justice minis-

tries, theological education and vocation, faith formation, local ministries, and conference leadership.

Together, United Church Women...

- pray about the issues and concerns they see around them
- educate themselves and others on those issues and concerns
- support the ministry of Mission & Service
- contribute designated funds that enable community and global partners to implement important projects.

Women for Change, Zambia

"Never accept poverty. Unite and fight it."

Women for Change (WfC) is a non-governmental organization that works in rural communities in Zambia, focusing on social and economic changes that empower women and children. Established in 1992, WfC has grown into one of the most influential indigenous NGOs in Zambia. Women for Change has been a partner of The United Church of Canada since 1992.

### Project description

Access to education for everyone, regardless of income, is an essential part of securing greater justice, broad-based participation in society, and the eradication of poverty. The United Church, working with Mission & Service global partners, understands education is a basic human right and a critical part of the global strategy to end poverty and ensure prosperity for all people over the next 15 years. While education is key to development many children face significant barriers to education, and in many countries girls face multiple challenges. Traditional attitudes toward women, poverty, early marriage, gender-based violence, poverty, and a choice to use scarce resources to educate boys rather than girls can all stand in the way of women and girls fully participating in education. When girls are denied opportunities for education, it has lifelong implications for women and communities. It decreases family income, increases health risks, and places women and girls at a higher risk of trafficking and exploitation. Accessible education for girls and women is an effective way to improve the lives of individual families as well as communities living in poverty.

While the Zambian government has made education a key priority and much work has been done, more remains to be done to create a stable and sustainable education system for children, particularly girls. One challenge is to win widespread social acceptance of education not only as a right, but also an essential component to addressing issues of poverty. This is a particular challenge in rural areas.

Women for Change is working to address the numbers of girls dropping out of school in

rural districts in Zambia. Social norms lead to an understanding that the appropriate role for girls is to be a good wife and mother, and cultural norms dictate that education is not necessary for that role. In traditional communities, girls who have entered puberty go through several rites of passage that prepare them for the role of wife and mother. After going through these rites, many parents opt to arrange marriages for their daughters rather than pay for education. Most families living in poverty would opt to keep boys in school and arrange marriages for girls.

The program works with adolescent girls aged 10–18 who often drop out of high school because of early marriage, teen pregnancy, or lack of water and sanitation. The program offers incentives to girls to motivate them to re-enroll in school. Teachers are given training to help support the girls in their return to school. An additional focus will be working with parents and traditional leaders to build awareness of the importance of education in reducing poverty and improving day to day lives for women and children.

Women for Change will co-ordinate with political, NGO, and community structures with similar goals to create an atmosphere that encourages girl children in rural areas to enroll and stay in school. To encourage families to keep their girl children in school, WfC will also work with parents of vulnerable children to promote livelihood training and entrepreneurship so that economic issues and hardships for families living in poverty are addressed.

### What can the UCW do?

- 1. Learn more about the barriers to education faced by women and girls in Zambia, Canada, and other places.
- 2. Support in prayer Women for Change and others working to remove barriers to education for girls.
- 3. Support local community initiatives such as homework clubs, school breakfast programs, and after-school programs that help children succeed in school.
  - 4. Advocate for effective international support for access to education.
  - 5. Contribute funds to help Women for Change keep girls in school.
