In the world of Mission and Service the News is Not Good

Nationally compared to last year we are tracking lower by 12.5 percent lower in our gifts to Mission and Service (as of October 31st). In the EOORC, we are down 20% compared to last year, or \$140,000.

These numbers are understandable because all churches are struggling with budgets weakened by the effects on this long running pandemic. Attendance is down and so is the giving on Sunday morning. But our Mission and Service partners are also struggling with their budgets due to the increase of clients forced to turn to food banks, soup kitchens, and shelters as the price of food, gas and rent steadily rise. People who could just make on their salaries now need to be subsidized to put food on the table and keep a roof over their heads. Our Mission and Service partners depend on the Support Grants they get from our region. Please do what you can to keep Mission and Service in the minds and hearts of your members.

On the plus side, gifts to Ukraine, COVID appeals, and Gifts with Vision are all doing really well. Thank you so much for your generosity.

The Six Ts of Stewardship

This coming year the Stewardship Team will be spreading the word about the **Six Ts of Stewardship**. When people think of Stewardship a lot of times, they only think about money but there is so much more to being a good steward than money. Instead, stewardship is a way of living.

"There is nothing we have; nothing; that is not a gift. Everything we are and everything we have is founded in the loving generosity of the Creator. When we know this, not just in our minds but in the depths of our hearts, then life takes on a whole new meaning. Then we have a whole different perspective about our time or our talents or our treasure, our bodies, our minds, hearts – everything that we are and everything that we have – takes on a completely different perspective."

So, what are the Six Ts of Stewardship? Most of us are familiar with the first three: Treasure, Time, Talent. But there are three others: - Tissue, Terrain and Testimony

Treasure simply means money. We all have our reasons for giving money to our churches and charities we are passionate about. We all have our own "Why I Give" story. Even if we don't think about it every time we give. The stewardship team members will be sharing their stories.

Time, we all know about the giving of our time or we would not be sitting here today. Volunteering is how churches are able to function and as Edward Everett said, "I am only one but still I am one. I cannot do everything, but still, I can do something."

Talent does not just mean the people who can sing or play music, or draw or write it means as Leo Buscaglia said, "Too often we underestimate the power of a touch, a smile, a kind word, a listening ear, an honest compliment, or the smallest act of caring, all of which have the potential to turn a life around."

Tissue can mean two things looking after ourselves physically and mentally but also promoting Blood, organ and tissue donations. "Self-care is never a selfish act—it is simply good stewardship of the only gift I have, the gift I was put on earth to offer to others." Parker Palmer

People who donate organs are blessed as they give others a second chance at life for others.

Terrain refers to the need to be good stewards of the environment. We should take good care of the earth by recycling and reducing consumption of resources. "Our stewardship of the Earth is brief. We owe it to those who follow to keep that in perspective, to be responsible passengers along the way." George H. W. Bush

Testimony is not just telling our story of our relationship with God but also through our actions. As Jared Brock is quoted as saying "God has written us a book, and now we have the opportunity to respond with our words and actions."

cheerful giver. And God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work.
