SETTING OUR SIGHTS! STRATEGIC PLANNING GROUP

The Setting Our Sights (SOS) Task Group will be launching the strategic planning process for the Eastern Ontario Outaouais Regional Council on the Friday afternoon of the meeting in Brockville. This will be a time to think about who we are as a region, the challenges we face and imagining what the future of the church will be/need to be.

From the beginning of June until the end of September, the SOS group will be inviting/challenging the member of the Regional Council to have conversations about the strategic plan for this region. The SOS group will hold a few town hall type gatherings, and we are inviting others to organize and facilitate conversations. The conversations may be a church Council or Board, or a group of colleagues, or an existing network or cluster within the region. This invitation may serve as a prompt to contact neighbouring churches to begin to form a cluster. The conversations can be in person or on line. The SOS group will provide some questions for discussion and ways of sending in responses.

The members of the SOS Task Group are: Cindy Casey (Kanata United, Ottawa), Liz Church (Portland), David Clemis (Orleans United, Ottawa), Paul Dillman (Riverside United, Ottawa), Mary Ruth Endicott (McKay United, Ottawa), Kimberly Heath (Wall St. United, Brockville), Sharon MacDonald (Sharbot Lake) and Mary Royal-Duczek (Almonte). Éric Hébert-Daly and Peter Bartlett are offering staff support.

The acronym for this group is SOS and that helps us to remember the urgency of this work as we respond to the General Council Strategic Plan, but also as we discern God's call amidst the changing landscape of the church and the needs of our communities and world. What can we do together to support growth and renewal in communities of faith? How can we make an impact on priority justice needs. How can we support and transform our models of leadership?
