Mission and Service – *This note from Sarah Charters (our Executive Officer of Philanthropy).* We would like to thank all the Communities of Faith who forwarded their contributions on time allowing our finance team to provide us with these numbers earlier than in previous years. We would also like to express our heartfelt appreciation for the ongoing and generous support you have given to Mission and Service.

There is good news to report. The Mission and Service contributions by Congregations, UCW and Special Donations all exceeded budget and the totals for these three areas, sitting at \$17,090,056, were slightly over the 2022 actuals of \$17,062,694. In addition, out of the 19 regions, only one was under the 2022 contributions and that was by a small amount.

The amounts raised for Mission and Service from Direct Gifts, Foundation Gifts and Legacies were below budget, as well as below the 2022 actual amounts. The total for these three areas in 2023 was \$3,741,507, which was below the 2022 actuals of \$4,069,520.

For this initial report, the total for Mission and Service from these areas was \$20,831,564. This compares favourably to the total budget of \$20,225,000 and is close to the 2022 actual amount raised of \$21,132,213.

Beautiful Music with MHI

One of the most surprising and moving moments at this year's Grammy Awards featured a string quartet. It wasn't the beautiful classical music they played, but, simply, their togetherness.

The CEO of the Recording Academy explained: "As individuals, they sound really good, but together, they achieve something beautiful they could never do apart. These musicians of Palestinian, Israeli, and Arab descent are here playing together. Now is the time for us, for humanity, to play together and to come together with empathy and with love." (Harvey Mason, Jr.). These four wonderful musicians set an example for the world, with their talents, efforts, and concern for humanity.

In a nutshell, that's what Multifaith Housing Initiative (MHI) strives to do. The organization is lifted and propelled by Jewish, Muslim, Baha'i, Hindu, Unitarian, and Christian communities -- including about 35 local United Churches. Rather than taking solo paths to create affordable housing in the Ottawa region, they perform together, with the shared goal of providing and promoting safe, affordable, and well-maintained housing in inclusive communities. This diversity extends to MHI's tenants, Board of Directors, committee members, other volunteers, Patrons, and staff -- and it encompasses an orchestra of colours and cultures.

It is beautiful to see strong, lifelong friendships based on mutual respect formed among people of different backgrounds. You can see it during the planning of an inspiring National Housing Day celebration. When tenants gather to experience a religious celebration. And when faith group members walk harmoniously together at MH's *Tulipathon* to raise funds for tenant subsidies. As well, Board and committee meetings begin with a reflection, typically an inspirational message drawing on various religious teachings. Over the next months you will see this diversity reflected in the planning for the Dream LeBreton Flats build - with its ambitious offering of community engagement programming and a strong Indigenous foundation.

Like the string quartet, MHI provides a positive example to the rest of the world. And we can all use some positivity. As Suzanne Le, MHI's Executive Director, says, "We don't find division in diversity. We are enriched by it. We are enriched because of it. And because of who we are – not despite it -- we have been gifted with the ability to serve the community in the most meaningful of ways. We provide those most at risk, most in need of our help, with a home. We give them a safe place to live, and a welcoming community in which to grow and thrive. A place where they are welcomed and valued. Where diversity is not just respected but honoured.

YOUTH - LOOKING FOR AN ADVENTURE?

Gibimihkaadimin is looking for 10 Indigenous youth from across Canada and 10 non-Indigenous youth from Southern and Eastern Ontario to participate in a reconciliation canoe trip this summer. Gibimishkaadimin (Gib-EE-mish-KA-dim-IN) is an Anishinaabemowin word representing "Paddling together by boat" and is the name of a reconciliation and relationship building opportunity for youth. This trip began over five years ago as an intentional youth reconciliation project between three United Churches in Toronto and is now a part of Indigenous Ministries and Justice and the General Council of the United Church. The purpose of this trip is for youth to participate in collaborative and experiential learning through an Indigenous perspective. Gibimishkaadimin seeks to provide youth with the opportunity to foster relationships with each other, the land and the water during a canoe trip in northern Ontario.

Ages: This trip is for Youth between the ages of 14-18. Youth must be within the age range during the trip.

When: Tuesday, August 20 to Wednesday, August 28, 2024

Where: Lake Temagami with Northwaters Outfitters

Cost: There is **no cost** to participate in this trip, this includes <u>all travel, accommodation, and outfitter costs</u>.

Funding is provided by Indigenous Ministry and Justice and the General Council in response to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada's calls to action.




