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EOORC in the News – Knitted Izzy Dolls

Bethel United Church (Rideau Ferry) recently hosted an event to created knitted "Izzy Dolls." These small hand-made dolls are named after Mark Isfeld, a Canadian soldier and UN peacekeeper. Master Cpl. Isfeld used to share small dolls with local children while on duty. He was killed by a landmine, but the peacekeeper dolls are still created in his memory and distributed around the world.

These Izzy Dolls are to be sent to France in commemoration of the $80^{\rm th}$ anniversary of D-Day and the Battle of Normandy.

When have you experienced a wonderful welcome at church? How can we provide a warm welcome to those who visit our congregations? What are some practical steps we can take?

These are questions that we have been exploring in EOORC. Our <u>winter educational event</u> had a theme of "Strengthening the Invitation." The Regional Council produced a helpful <u>checklist</u> for communities of faith to complete. A "mystery visitor" will be visiting each and every congregation in EOORC to help give feedback on how we are (or are not) welcoming newcomers.

Growth Animator Tori Mullin recently wrote a <u>blog post</u> called "*Welcoming a Child, Wiggles and All*." It is about their family's experience of being warmly welcomed when visiting a new church, and how that experience helped their daughter feel a sense of belonging in church.

Now we want to hear from all of you! Here are some wonderful ideas from folks in our region (paraphrased as they were shared orally):

At Kanata United Church, we invite children and their grownups to work together as **greeters**. Having greeters helps us ensure that new people are welcomed. The children do a great job, and they feel included because they have an important role. – Rev. Michelle Robichaud

At Woodroffe United Church, we have been having more children attend worship recently. I like **to include the children and the whole congregation in the sermon**. We don't have Sunday School every week, so it is helpful if the sermon is more interactive. Last week, I asked for ideas about how to help combat climate change, and they had some great ideas – especially the children. Discussion time also gives new people a chance to meet others in the congregation, especially if we are intentional about talking with those we don't yet know. – Rev. Kathryn Peate

My husband Wayne once attended church in Toronto and had **rainbow bread at Communion**. Each time they celebrated communion, a member of the congregation would bake the bread. They decided to add rainbow sprinkles to the dough before baking, and explained that it was a welcome to all God's children. I loved the idea and have shared it with many people since. – Rev. Anne Montgomery.






Are you an applicant or candidate in the Candidacy Pathway?



Book Review - A Church At War: MacKay Presbyterian Church, New Edinburgh and the First World War

If you're a congregant at an older church, or you enjoy visits to historic churches in Canada and elsewhere, you've probably seen them — plaques on the walls with lists of names. They're usually bronze but sometimes other material has been used. The names are mostly men, once in a while a woman's name is included in the group. These are memorial plaques, dedicated to members of that church's congregation who gave their lives in the two world wars of the 20th. century.

Who were these people and why or what made them want to "join up" to fight in battles across the ocean? Retired diplomat and historian Alan Bowker has answered those questions and more in his new book, "A Church At War: MacKay Presbyterian Church, New Edinburgh and the First World War."

The book focuses on the 19 men, members of MacKay's congregation, who fell in the First World War — "some as heroes in desperate battles, others in tragically random circumstances or from illness, several who have no known grave." Each get a chapter in the book, biographical in nature, detailing their early years growing up in the 'Burgh, family life, their parents, siblings, wives and children and how their survivors carried on with life after the war ended.

One of the most interesting parts of the book are the introductory chapters detailing social history of the time. Canada was still a British colony. Women did not have the vote. The 'Burgh was very much a working class area even though the Governor General was a close neighbor. In those days, churches played a major role in people's lives and church leaders were highly respected, frequently consulted and involved in the government's decision- making process.

At that time, the Canadian public regarded the British Empire as "the apogee of Christian civilization". It is easy to understand why young men who were brought up in that tradition would so quickly volunteer, believing that in defending Canada and the Empire, they were "fighting for justice, truth and righteousness and for the glory of God".

This is a wonderful book. Well-researched with detailed footnotes and bibliography, not to mention a plethora of historic photographs. It would be surprising if it did not make the Globe & Mail's selection of the 100 best non-fiction books of 2024. It should be available soon at Books on Beechwood.

Multifaith Housing – Tulipathon

Every May, among the beautiful backdrop of Dow's Lake and the Canadian Tulip Festival, members of different faith groups from across Ottawa gather for Multifaith Housing Initiative's annual Tulipathon fundraiser. Walking among a rainbow of tulips, people of all different ages, races, creeds, and religions come together to support MHI's mission of wanting all people to have safe and affordable housing in Ottawa. While the roots of the Canadian Tulip Festival date back more than 70 years, Tulipathon participants have been walking along the tulip-lined paths for almost 25 years.

The original charity walk, started in the 1990s by the late Dr. Farook Tareen with support from the Ottawa Muslim Association, departed from Dow's Lake and saw some participants walk all the way down the canal to the NAC and back. The original fundraiser only brought in about \$1,500 but the Tareen Family continued with the event year after year, eventually gifting the walkathon to MHI as their own charitable event. Now members from more than 70 faith groups gather for the annual walk and continue to fundraise in support of MHI, raising more than \$100,000 annually.

All proceeds from Tulipathon go towards MHI's subsidies program, helping to provide rent subsidies to MHI's 300-400 tenants. Every year MHI provides more than \$400,000 in rent subsidies, which wouldn't be possible without Tulipathon and the generous support of Ottawa's faith communities.

Each year at MHI's Annual General Meeting in April, there is an award given in Dr. Farook Tareen's name to celebrate outstanding Tulipathon fundraising efforts by a faith group from the previous year. In 2023, this award was given to the Ottawa Muslim Women's Association, who raised \$10,000 for tenant subsidies. Participating Tulipathon teams are also encouraged to bring a decorative banner to show their support for Tulipathon.

As Tulipathon nears its 25th anniversary, this year's event is sure to be another great success. Join the diverse faith groups of Ottawa, along with MHI donors, tenants, staff, and volunteers, on Sunday, May 26th for what promises to be one of the best Tulipathons yet!
