Financial Report:

The only unusual change is that we have had a lot of legal bills associated with Future in Property so I am beginning to track these separately and we will have to determine how to handle this in future years. These are "variable" expenses and therefore hard to budget for.

a) Profit and Loss - This report, which makes a distinction between Governance and Mission and Ministry, is up-to-date though I have not received any reports from General Council so all the entries are based on my projections for 2025. These totals will be close. Please note that we do transfer of investment budget on January 1 and so we always carry a large surplus for the first part of the year.

b) Budget verse Actual - This is a consolidated report that amalgamates Governance and Mission and Ministry. Some April expenses have been entered. Budget is target is between 25% and 33% at this juncture but please note that some expenses are "one-time".

c) Balance sheet. You will note that the three totals for the profit and loss tie into the balance sheet and match. You will also notice, that with the exception of HST, all carry overs for 2024 have been looked after and track down to zero.

Background:

The existing chair lift at Parkdale United Church requires replacement. The Chairlift provides access to mobility impaired persons to three levels of the very large church building. Without this chairlift, access to the levels of the building is severely impaired or prevented. The congregation has approved this expense and has allocated the amount of \$95,000 in the budget for 2025. The congregation has funds to carry out this project. The Trustees are also pursuing a request for a grant from the Church Extension Fund.

c) **Federal Elections** – Rev. Eric Hebert-Daly shared some details regarding the claim that the Federal *House* of *Commons Standing Committee on Finance* is considering removing the charitable status of churches. This has not been discussed by them and is a false claim. However, the claim is being used by a political party as a campaign issue. The General Council office is putting together a formal response and is also developing criteria for how the Church could/should respond to political issues. Charities are restricted to being partisan to a political party but are no longer limited in speaking out against political issues. The question was raised about personal social media pages. What is legal and appropriate are two separate issues. Legally, folks can post anything on their personal social media pages. However, it is important to keep in mind out viewpoints may be received, i.e., a minister. The General Secretary has a personal response to these issues in a video recently shared which provides sound advice.

The Executive Minister will prepare a communication piece for Communities of Faith to help provide some direction about how to effectively respond to political issues during election-time.

Appendix B

Parkdale United Church - Replacing the Chair Lift Project

Parkdale United Church occupies a building with a number of accessibility challenges, including a number of different points of entrance and many levels separated by stairs. Most entrances consist of a small landing and immediately face stairs going both up and down. A post-World War II addition to the building added the Memorial Hall, Sunday School rooms, a chapel and a gym to the existing Sanctuary building. At the nexus of these two main parts of the building is a staircase that joins many levels of the building, from the basement to Memorial Hall, the Sanctuary and the administrative offices and Parlour on the upper level.

This construction was done at a time before accessibility was a primary consideration in design. An exterior concrete ramp was built in the early 1980s that provided access to the Sanctuary and Memorial Hall levels. This ramp was eventually replaced in 2023. A platform chairlift was eventually installed in the early 1990s. A motorized platform for a wheelchair winds around a rail that is built around the staircase and provides access to several levels in the building.

Upper Canada Elevators has provided the primary maintenance and repairs services to the lift for many years.



Chair Lift Repairs has been a standing line item in the Capital Fund portion of Parkdale's Budget for many years as the aging lift has required more frequent part replacement and repairs. More recently, finding replacement parts has become a greater challenge.

In addition to regular worship services and a variety of activities that take place in the building, Parkdale runs a well known and established In From the Cold hot meal program from November to March of every year. The program provides over 100 hot meals to local residents every Saturday afternoon in Tape Hall, which is a large room in the basement of the Sanctuary and is connected to a large commercial size kitchen. The lift is regularly used to move several motorized wheel chairs up and down to provide access to individuals who attend the program on a weekly basis.

In August 2024, the lift broke down and was inoperable. Upper Canada Elevator has attempted to find parts for replacement, but without success. The lift has remained inoperable and this has significantly impacted the accessibility of the church.

Parkdale's Property Trustees have assessed the lift and determined that it needs to be replaced. A preliminary quote was obtained from Upper Canada Elevator for approximately \$89,000 for a complete replacement. Trustees have explored other options and contacted a variety of other elevator companies:

- As the church is considered a commercial property, a platform lift is required. It is not possible to have a seated chair lift installed.
- Most local companies specialize in platform lifts that are strictly vertical lifts and only transit from one level to another.

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Parkdale's Trustees have also considered installing a platform lift in another area of the building and received a quote from Upper Canada Elevator, but this was determined to not provide the same level of accessibility to the rest of the building and not cost effective. Likewise, consideration was given to not installing a lift as extensive as the existing lift, but this option was discarded for the same reasons.

Finally, Parkdale's Trustees considered the on-going work of the Property Development Working Group and the potential plans to undertake massive renovations or complete reconstruction of a building sometime in the future. Because no decision has been made and any construction work is likely to be several years in the future, it was the view of Trustees that this work should take place to ensure the existing building is accessible.

Therefore, Trustees have recommended to Parkdale United Church's Council that the lift be replaced, likely contracted with Upper Canada Elevators in 2025 and an amount (\$95,000) was included in the 2025 budget. Parkdale's Finance Committee and Council have supported this recommendation via endorsement of the budget. The budget was presented at the Annual General Meeting and the congregation was updated on the status and plans for the lift. The approach was also supported at the AGM via approval of the 2025 budget.

Funding will be provided from existing investments. A bequest or approximately \$20,000 (via an in-kind stock transfer) has been received to support the lift replacement. Because Parkdale received a grant of \$25,000 from the United Church Extension Fund in 2023 for the ramp replacement, we are not eligible to make another application. However, this report will be shared with the Extension Fund Committee and if there is an opportunity for funding, Parkdale Trustees are prepared to meet and discuss this further. Likewise, if EOORC has any advice on other potential grants or sources of funds, Trustees would appreciate this information.

Indigenous Representative Report to Eastern Ontario Outaouais Region Council Executive Meeting April 10, 2025

There has been no update with regards to the progress of re-instating the National Indigenous Church. The Elders are meeting every couple of weeks.

March 16, 2025 was a historic day for all of us at Navan-Vars United Church and for our online congregation. We welcomed Rev. Robert Patton from Kanesatake QC Mohawk reserve and Alma Ransom from Akwesasne QC reserve to worship with us. Robert is one of the Elders of what used to be The National Indigenous Church. My husband Reg and I were honoured to be invited to Robert's Ordination. Alma knew some of my Grandmother' Margaret Skidders' family growing up and has been able to fill me in on family history I had no knowledge of.

I was deeply moved and honoured when Robert gifted me with an Eagle's Feather in an unexpected ceremony. Alma explained the teaching of the Eagle's feather. It was a teaching I had not heard before. The ones I am familiar with are below. Alma explained that when it is my time to join the ancestors, there are two paths, and we have to choose which one to take. Because I have my Eagle's Feather, it will lead me down the path to Creator. Without my feather I would not know which path to choose, and would feel lost.

In many Indigenous traditions, the eagle, particularly the Golden Eagle, is revered as a symbol of love, strength, courage, and wisdom, often seen as having a close relationship to the Creator, and its teachings emphasize respect, honoring, and spiritual connection.

Here's a more detailed look at the teachings associated with the eagle:

Symbolism and Teachings:

• Love and Connection to the Creator:

The eagle is believed to fly closest to the Creator and is seen as a symbol of love, carrying prayers to the Great Spirit.

• Strength and Courage:

The eagle's powerful flight and sharp vision represent strength, courage, and the ability to see clearly.

• Respect and Honor:

Indigenous cultures show great respect and honor for eagles and their feathers, viewing them as sacred.

• Wisdom and Guidance:

The eagle's ability to soar high and see from great distances symbolizes wisdom and the ability to see the bigger picture.

• Reconciliation:

In some Indigenous communities, eagle feathers symbolize a step forward and a new chapter in reconciliation.

• Self-Love:

The eagle is seen as a teacher of self-love, emphasizing the importance of loving oneself to be able to help others.

• Focus and Vision:

The eagle's ability to focus on prey from great distances highlights the importance of having a vision and remaining focused on goals, regardless of obstacles.

• Leadership:

Eagles are often seen as leaders, flying alone and at high altitudes, demonstrating the importance of independent thinking and high standards.

Members of my family joined us for church and lunch together and it was a time of learning, sharing and unconditional love and acceptance.
