Advent and Christmas Message

Every year, I plan how I will make the Advent season a little calmer. I strategize: Any worship services I am leading will be planned *early*! The cookies will be baked and the presents bought *early*! I will meal prep and write the cards and make the phone calls and do all the things...*early*! Everything will be orderly, nothing will be rushed.

Every year, I make these plans. And every year, something comes up. A cold, a flu, or a virus. Snow, or freezing rain, or both. A pandemic. An unexpected opportunity to help welcome a refugee family – if the paperwork is in by December 31st. A pregnancy and morning sickness. A baby who won't sleep. An unexpected sense of call. More snow.

Yesterday, I was panicking about all the things left undone on my pre-Christmas to-do list. Today, I am remembering: This happens every year, right about now. Every year, I have this moment of Advent panic. And every year (even if it involves a late night, or too much tea, or dropping a few less-important things from my list), it is all ok. Every year, Christmas still comes. Our work matters — whether it is planning a holiday meal...calling someone who is lonely...choosing the hymns for Christmas Eve...putting on the coffee at church — it does matter. But at the same time, the wonder of God's love incarnate (thankfully!) does not rest on our abilities to check all the boxes by December 25th.

As we continue in this season of Advent, may the blessing of God be upon you. May the peace of Jesus Christ surround you. And in this season of waiting and cookies and flus and snow...may the Holy Spirit guide your way.

The article talks about the church's community drop-in program and how the church worked with their local community to collect food for a family in need in South Glengarry as well as to knit or crochet 150 pieces of warm winter clothing (hats, mittens, socks and more) for donation to Centre 105 and Agape Centre. It is a joy to read about this congregation's ministry in the community.

Bill C-9

We have been advised by the United Church of Canada's Government Relations staff that some clergy have received calls from Pierre Poilievre's office on the federal Bill C-9 and have thought this sharing would be helpful.

"We understand from regional colleagues that local ministers are getting calls about an amendment to the Criminal Code; these calls imply that the amendment will "stop them from preaching the gospel." This description may not be accurate. What the amendment would do is remove a legal defence that allows someone to rely on religious text if they are charged with **willfully** promoting hatred. We are analyzing the possible implications of that change. This particular amendment has been approved at committee level, but not approved by Parliament. Nothing will happen with this bill until Parliament returns to sit after the break.

The United Church of Canada has endorsed <u>this public statement</u> against the current Bill C-9. In the New Year, we will analyze these new proposals and plan to communicate our position before Parliament returns at the end of January."


